Students of different ages and levels of ability may be in the classrooms which are smaller than the regular ones.
- Community School: The basis of the Community School idea is that to be having community is to be people in community. Teachers work with the community members, including families, residents, organizations, and officials codifying support, and expanded learning, which encompasses among other things, after school and summer programs. The school is a fit as a ground in which the community settles down to engage, improve, social, development, other activities of the school.

The Characteristics of Holistic Education

- It instead "embraces the idea that cultures are fashioned by people and can be altered by people"; rather than replicating or conforming to the state of existing culture.
- It is based on a 'deep reverence for life and for the unknown (and never knowable) source of life.'

Principles of Holistic Education

Two principles are upheld by holistic education (Miller, 2000)

- 1. Learning by individual to the world should begin with the individual themselves—not with an abstract concept of a human being, but with the unique, living person—boy or girl, young man or woman (or even an older adult)—who stands before the teacher. Each individual has a vibrant mix of experiences, emotions, thoughts, aspirations, fears, and hopes.
- 2. Additionally, we need to engage with the learner using an open and curious mindset, along with a deep understanding of the world they are entering. Advocates of holistic education argue that the ideas central to this approach are not new; rather, they have long been part of our philosophical traditions. In fact, many institutions already implement the principles and practices of holistic education. The first principle emphasizes that learning aimed at connecting the individual to the world must begin with the person present. The second principle concerns the valuable act of being open and curious when interacting with the learner while possessing a great insight of the world the learner will be going through.

Oualities of Holistic Education

Joseph (2009) says the following regarding the key characteristics of holistic education:

- There is a focus on the inner lives of students, encompassing their emotions, dreams, thoughts, and inquiries that they bring to their education. Modern education is no longer simply about sharing knowledge or spreading ideas; rather, it is a journey that explores both the inner self and the external world. It assists children in gaining insight into their own identities while also fostering a connection to the larger environment.
- Holistic education reflects an awareness of ecological principles; it acknowledges that all things
 in existence are interconnected. This perspective involves a profound respect for the truth of the
 natural world, if not a deep reverence for nature itself.
- It is a perspective that values diversity, whether it be in the natural world or among different cultures. It avoids rigid ideologies, classifications, and definitive solutions, instead celebrating the dynamic interconnections of all living beings.

Four 'Pillars of Learning' in Holistic Education

While holistic education merely lists four pillars of learning in the twenty –first century for methodological purposes only, there are other holistic learning minded ways we can implement to our strategies towards teaching and learning. These four pillars were also pointed out by UNESCO (2004) with the slightest differences (Nava, 2001).

1. Learning to Live Together: This involves understanding how to live with responsibility, honouring and collaborating with others, and generally fostering harmony with all living beings on Earth. It acknowledges the individuality of each person. Education must break through biases, stubbornness, discrimination, authoritarianism, and stereotypes, as well as anything that fuels



- conflict, disagreement, and war. The core concept of this educational tenet is interdependence or awareness of the life network. (Nava, 2001). The educational approach implied by the second principle is based on two paths, at the one hand discovering others and at the other, shared objectives from one's life onward.
- 2. Learning to Do: In today's context, this refers to acquiring the ability to effect change in society through thoughtful, informed, and accountable actions. Learning to do involves developing skills and becoming productive. It also indicates the necessity of adapting in job demands and the capacity to collaborate effectively within a team, using information strategically to tackle problems and make sound decisions that lead to high-quality products and services. Additionally, it teaches us how to manage risks and seize opportunities.
- 3. Learning to Learn: It begins with the ability to ask questions. This curiosity drives the desire to discover and understand a lot in future. Asking questions is a fundamental aspect of consciousness in its quest for knowledge. This true aim isn't solely about finding answers, but rather about exploring possibilities. This process enhances key aspects of consciousness, enabling skills such as focus, active listening, perception, and fostering curiosity, intuition, and creativity. Learning to learn involves taking charge of one's own education, staying informed, and knowing where to seek information. It particularly relates to cultivating scientific awareness or fostering a scientific mindset.
- 4. Learning to Be:The acquirement of knowledge, skills or values through which one acquires the mental function of understanding, the moral and cultural, and physical functions which foster the development of one's person and being, can be expressed as learning to be the journey into becoming more human. This suggests a curriculum designed to nurture and hone qualities like imagination and creativity, embrace commonly shared human values, and unlock individual potentials. It aids in enhancing memory, reasoning skills, aesthetic appreciation, physical abilities, and social communication. Moreover, it supports the growth of critical thinking, encourages independent judgment, and fosters a sense of personal commitment and accountability.
